Animals are typically categorized as unavailable for adoption for the following reasons:

- They are new to the shelter and undergoing medical procedures, health evaluations, behavioral evaluations, or need some time to decompress.
- They are undergoing a mandatory hold
- They are a <u>SafePet</u> animal seeking refuge in our shelter
- They are protective custody animal due to the result of an animal cruelty investigation. These dogs are technically not our dogs to adopt out. We are going through the legal system to have the current owner or the court to sign the pet over to us.
- They are pending adoption
- They are too young for adoption

EXPERIENCED FOSTER NEEDED

At just over one year old, Junior was not given a fair chance in life. He spent most of that year in a crate, and was never taught proper training, manners, or any sort of daily routine. His parents lived in the same home, but they were kept separated from Junior. He had no guidance to learn how to become the best he can be. But beyond the lack of learning, Junior was suffering from neglect.

Our Humane Society Police Officer rescued Junior in March and brought him to the shelter.

Junior is a big puppy with an even bigger heart, but he needs someone who is able to work with him. We are looking for an adult only home with large breed experience. If that someone is you, please apply to become a **dog foster on our website**.
