

2023 IMPACT AND STATISTICS

Animal shelters and rescue organizations nationwide are struggling with stray animals entering their care, particularly stray dogs. The York County SPCA is no exception. 34% more stray dogs entered our shelter than in 2022, which presented a significant challenge for our staff and volunteers.

Below is a snapshot of our 2023 outcomes.



How Do We Measure Up?

The Pennsylvania state average save rate is 85.8%. Of the 85 animal shelters in PA, 56 report their data. 56% of animal shelters in the United States are designated no-kill shelters. *

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WHAT IS SAVE RATE?

The percentage of animals who enter the shelter and leave alive each year.

WHAT DOES " NO-KILL " REALLY MEAN?

"No-Kill" means we're saving every animal that can be saved. To achieve no-kill status, the organization's save rate should be 90% or greater.

WHAT IS THE GREATEST THREAT?

Stray Canine Intake. We know that more homeless dogs will continue to enter our shelter, so we must expand our canine programming. In 2024, we plan to grow our canine leadership team, create new opportunities for our dogs to play and decompress, and get more dogs into loving temporary (foster) and permanent homes.

The shelter is a stressful place for animals. Our staff and volunteers work hard to provide ample enrichment and play for the pets in our care, but it will never compare to a loving home. This is why **fostering** is so critical to our success. Not only do these families create the capacity for us to care for more animals, but for pets struggling in the shelter environment, it can make a **lifesaving** difference.

Talulah dealt with severe health challenges during her time in our care. Thanks to the dedication of her foster, Sarah, she could decompress and get healthy until her special forever family came forward. She was adopted in April 2023.

Spaying and Neutering Saves Countless Lives



Since opening its doors in 2013, the clinic has performed more than 83,000 surgeries.

In the ten years since the clinic opened, the number of surgeries performed per year has doubled, expanding the efficiency of operations while ensuring patient safety and staff wellbeing. In 2023, the clinic increased the number of surgeries performed by nearly 20% through efficient techniques and strategic scheduling. The clinic was built to manage a maximum of 35 surgeries a day. Now, on our busiest days, our team is performing upwards of 65 surgeries per day.

The spay/neuter clinic is essential to ensure public health and safety. Every community cat and owned pet that enters the clinic is given a rabies vaccination if they are not already up to date. Rabies is a zoonotic disease that can transfer to humans and is invariably fatal. In 2023, the spay/neuter clinic provided 9,818 rabies vaccinations.


2023 SPAY/NEUTER STATS

Our Spay/Neuter Clinic performed a record-breaking 11,862 spay/neuter surgeries!

7,687 community cats were spayed or neutered. Of those, 4,267 were female.
