Animals are typically categorized as unavailable for adoption for the following reasons:

- They are new to the shelter and undergoing medical procedures, health evaluations, behavioral evaluations, or need some time to decompress.
- They are undergoing a mandatory hold
- They are a <u>SafePet</u> animal seeking refuge in our shelter
- They are protective custody animal due to the result of an animal cruelty investigation. These dogs are technically not our dogs to adopt out. We are going through the legal system to have the current owner or the court to sign the pet over to us.
- They are pending adoption
- They are too young for adoption

MOMENT OF REMEMBRANCE TO BABY GIRL

Baby Girl, originally known as Haven, was a dog who many use to know at the shelter. She had an amazing story about a fight for survival, and after her recovery and adoption went on to assist volunteers in teaching children about the prevention of animal abuse.

Our very own Volunteers, Peg and Scooter, adopted Baby Girl after spending time with her as her foster parents. As Baby Girl passed away this summer, they shared with us her story. We felt others who knew Baby Girl would appreciate hearing her story as well. This is what they shared:

Baby Girl (Haven) came to the York County SPCA in January 2010. She had a fractured left back leg from being hit by a car, a 12 in stick down her throat, and was left in a trash can. Her spirit to live was what kept her alive until a little girl coming home from school found her and told her mother. They then called the animal control officer, and she was then placed in the hands of the staff at the York County SPCA. She was treated and placed into a foster family for her recovery care. She was a sad and broken little girl but I could see the hope in her eyes that she would make a full recovery. After several weeks, she started to show signs of a happy little girl wagging



her tail and staring to play with my other dogs. I knew then that she was going to be my little girl, so we adopted her and she became family. What a great little girl. She loved to travel and to go camping with us. She loved to sit on the deck and watch the neighbor's chickens and goats all day. Every morning she would sit with me to get her little belly rubbed. That would start our day, and at night when it was time to go to bed she would come in and curl up with me and sleep tight up against my back until time to get up. Since we adopted her 11 years ago she has been loved and cared for every day of her life, but unfortunately, we cannot foresee everything and the worst happened to her. She became sick ,and we rushed her to the Emergency Hospital where she was diagnosed with kidney failure. We lost her on August 5th, 2021. I will sadly miss her for the rest of my life.

Baby Girl will be missed and remembered by all the lives she touched.
