- **Sheltered over 2,700 animals** providing medical care, enrichment, and love.

SAVE RATE



93.8%

Save rate is the percentage of animals entering our shelter population each year that leaves with a live outcome.

A 90% or better save rate earns the designation of "no-kill," meaning we saved all the animals that can be saved. We are proud to have achieved this distinction for the third consecutive year.

SPAY/NEUTER CLINIC

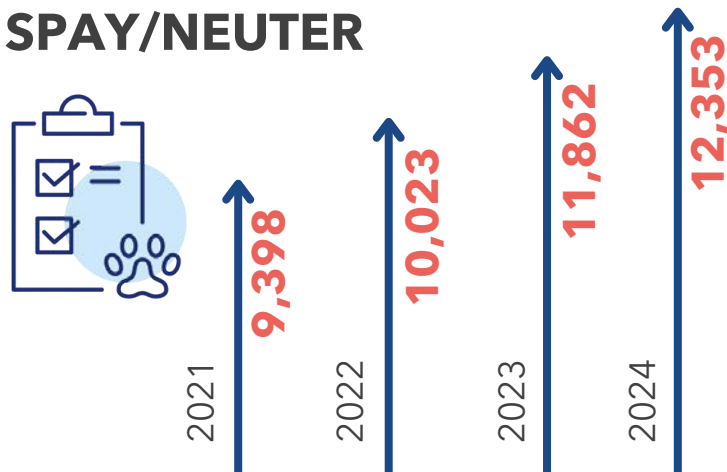
Our clinic not only provides essential spay/neuter surgeries for pets and community cats, but every animal leaving our care is also vaccinated against rabies—a deadly zoonotic disease that can be transmitted to humans. Starting in 2025, we will take our commitment a step further by microchipping every owned pet that visits our clinic. This ensures that, if they are ever lost, they will have a greater chance of being reunited with their families. This is just one of the many ways we work to support both the people and pets of York County.

Police departments across York County rely on Officer Cruz's expertise to address animal-related issues, allowing them to dedicate their time and resources to other community priorities.

Officer Cruz works tirelessly to seek justice for animals who cannot speak for themselves. **In 2024, after four years of litigation, a heartbreaking animal cruelty case involving over 20 neglected pets finally concluded.** Thanks to Officer Cruz's dedication, these animals now have the chance to live safe and happy lives.

The York County SPCA collaborates with local community groups to help York County residents stay connected with their beloved pets.

In 2024, we partnered with Girl Scout Troop 2083 on their Silver Award project. The troop raised funds to purchase microchip scanners and educated the community on the importance of microchipping pets.

These scanners were then distributed to local animal control officers and police departments, empowering them to reunite lost pets with their families quickly—often without the need for a stressful stay at the shelter.
